Description of factors considered.

U.N. Global Compact violations: Sustainalytics' Global Standards Screening assesses a company's impact on stakeholders and the extent to which a company causes, contributes to, or is linked to violations of international norms and standards (U.N. Global Compact, Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, the U.N. Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights and their underlying conventions).

Environmental, social, and governance ratings: Sustainalytics' environmental, social, and governance ratings measure how well issuers proactively manage ESG issues that are the most material to their business.

Sustainalytics' Carbon Risk Score assesses a company's carbon risk, driven by the transition to a low-carbon economy. The ratings are determined by an evaluation of a company's material exposure to and management of carbon issues.

Minority Empowerment Score / Indicator Score: The Minority Empowerment Score is calculated as a weighted average of the following indicator scores: board diversity, discrimination policy, scope of social supplier standards, freedom of association policy, diversity programs, community development programs, health and safety management system, conflict mineral programs, media ethics programs, human rights programs, editorial guidelines, advertising ethics, human capital development, responsible product offering, responsible marketing policy, human rights policy, gender pay and equality programs, gender pay disclosure. The indicator weights are determined by Sustainalytics based on the indicator's importance to determine a company's performance.

Controversy Ratings: Controversy ratings: Using smart technologies to monitor more than 700,000 news stories daily,

Sustainalytics' Controversies Research identifies companies involved in ESG-related incidents. These incidents are assessed through a framework that considers the severity of incidents, the corporations' accountability, and whether they form part of a pattern of corporate misconduct. Investors use Controversies Research to support investment decisions, including screening and engagement, and to manage reputational risks.

 This index's controversy ratings are based on employee incidents, social supply chain incidents, society and community incidents.

Verification and quality of data:

The verification and quality of data are checked both externally and internally by automated and manual quality assurance processes involving, inter alia, change control; change mapping; ID mapping; exception reporting; prepublication reviews; continuous incident monitoring; quarterly rebalancing; and centralized definitions.

Incorrect pricing and corporate action data for individual issues in the database will be corrected upon detection. In addition, an incorrect divisor of an index, if discovered within five days of its occurrence, will always be fixed retroactively on the day it is discovered to prevent an error from being carried forward. Commercially reasonable efforts are made to correct an older error subject to its significance and feasibility.

Sustainalytics Quality Approach to ESG Rating:

Universe Management

- Centralized universe definitions and processes for rebalancing;
- Quarterly rebalances of Sustainalytics' standard coverage and compliance universes;

Controversial weapons: International treaties and conventions used to define controversial weapons include the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (1968), Biological and Toxin Weapons Convention (1972), Chemical Weapons Convention (1997), Anti-Personnel Mine Ban Convention (1999), Convention on Cluster Munitions (2008), United Nations Convention on Certain Conventional Weapons (1980), and Convention on the Physical Protection of Nuclear Material (1980).

The methodology behind Sustainalytics' Global Standards Screening is based on the following international standard:

- On top of these international (convention-based) standards, we also look at industry-specific standards or initiatives.
